We are proud of our Senior Staff Nurse from our Home Care service, Muhammad Ikliluddin Bin Abdul Rahmat who was one of the recipients for Nurses' Merit Award 2022. Through this interview, Ikli share his nursing journey and what this award means to him.

1. Why did you pursue nursing as a career?

I was encouraged to join nursing by a family friend who shared her passion for the job. I was inspired to join palliative nursing as the team showed me that palliative was not about death but was about how patients can live with dignity before their end of life. In order to do so, I took a Specialist Diploma in Palliative Nursing and pursued my passion in palliative nursing in the community.

2. Why did you join palliative nursing?

Upon graduating from Diploma in Nursing in 2009, I started working in the general medical ward nursing in an acute hospital. In 2018, I decided to join Dover Park Hospice Home Care team where the team has shown me that palliative was not about death but was about how patients can live with dignity before their end of life.

3. Do you face any challenges at work?

What keeps me going is that nursing allows me to help people. However, I have found it difficult to deal with patients and family at their end of life as I always feel that there is more that I could have done for them.

4. Can you share a memorable experience at work?

I have been blessed with many sweet memories of my patients and their families with every single connection holding a special place in my heart. One of the patients that made a lasting impression on me, was an elderly gentleman who stays alone in Singapore, with this family in Batam. When he fell ill, his daughter who was in her early twenties, fulfilled his wish and came to Singapore to care for him until his final days. However, it was not an easy process for

her as she had trouble coping with increasing care needs and struggled to come to terms with her emotions. On top of that, neighbours were

not friendly towards her and thought she was denying her father of treatment in a hospital. On many occasions, the team had to intervene by providing emotional and mental support to his daughter after office hours, reaching out to their neighbours to defuse the situation, and in extreme cases, contacting the police.

However, with the good support from my nursing colleagues, medical and psychosocial teams, we were able to make our patient's wish of passing on in the comfort of his own home with his daughter around, a reality.

5. What does this award mean to you?

Winning this award makes me happy and felt that my hard work is acknowledged. It encourages me to give even more to my patients. At the same time, I feel humbled as none of this would be possible without the support of the wonderful team at Dover Park Hospice that always has my back.

6. Being a nurse for more than 10 years, do you have any encouraging words for those who wish to pursue nursing as a career?

I would highly recommend nursing as a career for anyone who's interested in helping others and making a difference in someone else's life.
