Volunteer Stories

Old Memories New Adventures

Dover Park Hospice is Singapore's first purpose-built hospice which was established in 1992 and have since served over 12,000 terminally-ill patients. Since 1995, the hospice has been sited at 10 Jalan Tan Tock Seng in an iconic red-brick building that was designed with a serene and tranguil environment to provide comfort and care to terminally-ill patients and their families. In November 2023, Dover Park Hospice officially moved to our new home at the TTSH Integrated Care Hub (TTSH-ICH) within HealthCity Novena, with larger premises that will enable us to serve more patients. In this issue, we invite a few volunteers to reminisce about the past and share their favourite memories from volunteering at 10 Jalan Tan Tock Seng.

Q1: Could you share with us your favourite memories of 10 Jalan Tan Tock Seng? This could include special events in the past, your volunteering experience, or anything related to Dover Park Hospice that is significant to you.

Joyful Outings and Lifelong Lessons

Chan Yoke Wan: I remember fondly how the late Mrs Ong Kim Ling took hospice patients for outings to 'makan angin' (a Malay expression which means to "get some fresh air") occasionally and soon started the Thursday Outing Group (TOG) in 1995/6, with a handful of volunteers, including myself. This activity proved to be very popular amongst patients and their relatives. In those exciting 'start-up' years, we engaged in a bit of Do-It-Yourself and trial-and-error, with the support of equally enthusiastic doctors and nurses. We had great fun and created countless heart-warming memories with our patients. I recall an incident when a patient, under the care of a volunteer who was inexperienced with handling

a wheelchair, ended up stuck in a shallow drain. The remorseful volunteer profusely apologised to the patient for the unfortunate mishap. However, the patient smiled sweetly and replied, "No pain, I am on morphine; I am so happy to be going outdoors".

Indeed, we have learnt so much from these patients.

They generously share their stories with us, expressing kind concerns for our well-being even during their own challenging times. Their appreciation for our (sometimes clumsy) efforts will always remain in my memories.

Her words left a deep impression on me, prompting contemplation and inspiring me to volunteer for a hospice.

On another occasion, Malay volunteers assisted in arranging and organising a solemnisation in the hospice's auditorium for a patient who wished to witness her grandson's wedding. It was a sombre yet joyous event for the patient, who passed away two days
